The 'staff' Interview Kirk Dumpleton 1994-2016 Part time 2016- present

1. What did you study at University – why that subject in particular?

I took a joint honours degree in History / PE and initially taught both subjects. It was a

close call with English but an inspirational history teacher helped give me a long term passion for the subject.

2. Do you have any fond memories of your time at university?

I had a good group of friends. The athletics coach had got 6 of us who were athletes on the same accommodation floor, and we maintained a strong bond











across the 4 years of the course. There was a lot of practical, and I fondly remember doing my best against a rugby prop forward in a judo match.

- 4. I think you came into teaching late! If so what did you do before joining RPS?

After graduating from Loughborough University I spent two years teaching at a school in Hemel Hempstead but left teaching for a while after this, working for the sports company Nike before opening and running my own sports shop for 7 years. It was great experience, but an economic recession and ever increasing rents led me to close the shop.

5. Why did you take up teaching as a career?

I enjoy teaching my specialist subjects and working with young people. I wanted to help students secure good exam results but also aimed to deliver lessons in an engaging way, encouraging the students to feel safe to express their views.

6. Why did you choose Roundwood Park School and have you ever worked in another school?

A good friend told me about a vacancy at Roundwood Park School. [Mrs Gordon – a maths teacher at the school.] I was impressed by the atmosphere and ethos in the school, as well as the good exam results achieved. My first school in Hemel Hempstead was a small comprehensive with 600 students. After I closed my sports shop I worked at a large multi-cultural school of 1400 students in Harrow for a year before coming to Roundwood Park.

7. Why did you choose to teach the subjects (RE, History, Gen Studies) you did?

History and PE are my specialist subjects, but at RPS I have also taught RE and PSHE / Citizenship up to year 9 and General Studies to the 6th Form. I think these subjects are great for discussing moral issues which are common place in modern society and recognising the different views people hold. I believe that learning to argue your case in an informed way is a great skill which can be developed in these subjects.

8. What do/did you most enjoy about your many roles at RPS?

I enjoyed being part of the Senior Leadership team as an Assistant Head teacher, and contributing to decisions intended to make this school the best it can be for the students here. I am now used predominantly as a history teacher and still enjoy teaching this as a specialist subject. Being a Head of Year and helping students and families deal with difficult circumstances they faced was not easy at times, but was also very rewarding work.

9. If you have to pick out one thing that you most enjoyed here, what would it have been?

In my 24 years at Roundwood Park I have most enjoyed the way that a strong relationship between staff and students has been maintained. I believe that the staff here really care about students as individuals as well as wanting them to gain good results and open the doors to future paths they wish to pursue. The staff here have always been a friendly bunch and supportive of each other.

10. Rumour has it that you were an accomplished athlete and that you once raced against both Steve Ovett and Sebastian Coe and beat them? True?

Yes. When I was 16 I beat Ovett [2nd] and Coe [10th] to win the English Schools Cross Country Championship. Although I did not go on to Olympic glory I ran 4minutes 01 seconds for the mile and 2 hours 24 minutes for the marathon, winning a number of regional and national titles and competing for England several times.

11. When did you take up running and do you still run to keep fit or for competition?

I started cross country running at school at the age of 13. I don't compete now but do some running, swimming and work in the multi-gym several times a week to try and keep in shape.

12. Do you have any special moments that stand out that you are willing to share about your experiences at RPS?

I have been delighted with the achievements of numerous students that I have taught over the years. It is such a privilege to teach here amongst some extremely gifted students, but just helping students do their best has been special. I remember one boy who struggled to write more than 4 lines for a history essay in Year 7, but went on to get a GCSE and A-Level grade B in the subject. A great achievement. The PE department here are fabulous, and sporting successes have brought special memories. See below.

13. Did you also take part in extra-curricular activities such as visits or sporting events with the students?

I coached a rugby team for several years and have helped with the athletics coaching for most of my years here. Being district athletics champions in my first few years here and achieving this again last year with a great young squad was memorable. My son being in the rugby First 15 that went almost unbeaten by local Hertfordshire schools recently was a great personal memory.

14. How do you feel you made an impact at RPS?

Students tell me that they find me approachable and able to discuss when things are going well or not so well and help they might need. I believe I have helped students gain the exam success they have wanted, but have also sought to encourage all students of all ability levels and characters to believe in themselves. A few years ago a young man came up to me in a fast food restaurant where I had taken my children after a swimming session. He said that he just wanted to tell me how much he had enjoyed having me as a GCSE history teacher. I was humbled and honoured to receive this comment and delighted to see how he had developed from a quiet, shy Year 10 into a confident young man who took the trouble to say this to me. This is the sort of impact we try to make as teachers.

15. After many years teaching full time you have opted to go part time. What has led you to this?

As my children have moved to, or are about to move on to university, I have reduced my work load to 3 days a week. This is allowing me to balance the enjoyment of still making an impact through teaching with having more time to spend with my wife, wider family and do a little more travelling to places we have wanted to visit.

16. Do you have any hobbies or leisure commitments that you enjoy or can share?

I have become more of a gardener in recent years, which will amuse older friends who know I was fairly ignorant about the world of shrubs and flowers! I have always enjoyed reading both factual and fictional works and continue to do so in times of leisure. Maintaining some kind of fitness routine is something I like to do even as the years are added on!

17. Given the changes in education over the years would you, given your time again, go into teaching or into another profession?

I still believe that teaching is a great profession. There is far more administrative work involved in the job now, but if you have real passion for your subject and working with young people then it is still a great career. To me, having some time to experience the world of work outside of teaching was also ideal.

18. When students look back on their time at RPS how would you like to be remembered?

He cared about us, brought some fun into the learning and helped us to do our best.
