Ant-Man and the Wasp Review





Another fun, exciting adventure from Marvel, featuring Paul Rudd as Ant-Man, aka Scott Lang, Evangeline Lilly as The Wasp, aka Hope Van Dyke and Michael Douglas as Dr Hank Pym.

IT'S been two years since Ant-Man last made a feature in the Marvel Universe, notably absent from Avengers: Infinity War. The crossing over timelines in the film suggest that this riveting story takes place not too soon before Infinity War begins...

Opening with a creative home scene, the mood is very intense, setting us up for a scare until you realise Lang is just playing a very cleverly created mission impossible game with his daughter Cassie (Abby Ryder Fortson), orchestrated by best friend Luis (Michael Peña). The scene ends with Lang accidently

kicking a hole in his back-garden fence and setting off the tracker still on his ankle, his house arrest punishment for supporting Captain America (Chris Evans) two years prior.

From then on, the film is of high-intensity and fast paced, flying through the action and crazy moments and my attention was unwavering through this comedy-action master piece.

Although the storyline was fairly basic – Van Dyke and Pym discovering they could find Mrs Van Dyke (Michelle Pfeiffer) and bring her out of the Quantum Realm, with a couple of good old-fashioned villains trying to steal their work or trying to stop them, including the cops, a new member of the universe Ava, aka Ghost and Dr Pym's old friend Dr Bill Foster (Laurence Fishbourne) (a tragic, yet predictable twist) – the film itself meets the expectations and standard of the first of Ant-Man.

A few comedic moments featuring Luis were well received, as well as the Feds repeatedly destroying Lang's house and a scene featuring a strange looking Lang, in his adult body but the height of a young child.

We also get an insight into the much-anticipated debut of The Wasp, who stole the show, the chemistry and connection between Rudd and Lilly undeniable, along with the debut of Mrs Van Dyke; we are shown a nostalgic flashback from before she disappears and Rudd's characterisation of her is iconic and brilliantly done.

Lacking in the usual seriousness of a Marvel movie, with all its usual end-of-the-world drama, it was a fun, family-friendly story, with its emphasis on the importance of friends, families, morals and values.

Ant-Man and the Wasp is a captivating must-see, worth a watch if you fancy an actioncomedy.

Growing up in the UK as British-Iranian

In 1996, my parents and my older sister, collectively moved to Glasgow, Scotland from Tehran, Iran – of course, with my parents being born and raised in the mysterious country most commonly known as 'Iran', a huge, bubble of cultural shock formed around them, when my dad decided to migrate 3,820.7 miles, in order to study Medicine at the University of Glasgow.



We soon moved to Bristol, then Hertfordshire, Harpenden. Harpenden is a fairly middle-class, typically British area, with 85.7% of residents being 'White British', *excluding* Irish and other white.

My sister and I became two bilingual, dual national girls, and part of the Iranian diaspora. Those who identify themselves as British-Iranian, do this purely due to the fact that they don't necessarily identify with being 'just British', or 'just Iranian', they see themselves as both.

When I first learnt to talk, I spoke the language of Farsi – the Persian language, spoken in Iran, Afghanistan, Tajikistan, Uzbekistan, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Turkey, Kazakhstan, Turkmenistan and other regions within the Middle East.

Soon after starting school, I focused more heavily on my English speaking, rather than my Farsi. Although English is not spoken at home in my household, I would find myself listening in Farsi, and replying in English.

This proceeded to form an 'in between' language, a mix of the two – especially during this 'transition' period of going to school and mostly speaking English, after only speaking Farsi beforehand. For example, at school when we were learning the names of colours, fruits, vegetables and numbers, I would put my hand up to say what these were called but would get the answers wrong because I would say the Farsi name instead of the English word. Often to this day, when I can't think of the English word for something, I know exactly what it would be in Farsi – it's easy to get muddled up.

Having said this, I have no memory of learning either language, I was never fundamentally 'taught' how to speak either -I just did.
