



The one-off 2020-21 16 to 19 Tuition fund

The 16 to 19 tuition fund is £96 million of one-off funding for the 2020 to 2021 academic year only. It is ring fenced funding for schools, colleges and all other 16 to 19 providers to mitigate the disruption to learning arising from coronavirus (COVID-19).

The funding is being provided to support tuition for 16 to 19 students in English, maths, and other courses where learning has been disrupted. For example, vocational courses where assessment has been deferred because of lockdown.

Roundwood Park have been allocated £566 of 16 to 19 tuition funding. This is an allocation of £150 per instance for full time students without GCSE grade 4 or above in English and/or maths based on the numbers in their current 2020 to 2021 academic year allocation).

Roundwood have decided to supplement the Tuition fund allocation to broaden the scope of support. As such, the provision detailed below covers a wider selection of students.

Which students at Roundwood Park will benefit from the 16-19 Tuition fund?

Roundwood Park Sixth Form students that didn't achieve a Grade 4 in either English or maths in 2020 (and didn't attain a Grade 4 in the November 2020 retake) will benefit. In addition, students in receipt of the 16 to 19 Bursary, who are taking courses that require core subject support for Level 3 studies have also been identified and will benefit from additional tutoring. Where possible, students that achieved less than a grade 5 at GCSE in 2020 and are following a programme of study that requires core subject support will benefit from additional tuition. In total, funds will cover additional tutoring for 20 students identified to benefit from core subject support.

What tuition will the students benefit from? The students that are eligible for tuition, will be offered 1:1 tutoring with MyTutor, in line with the provision and company providing tuition to KS4. Each student will receive 10 sessions of 1:1 tutoring in a core subject. All MyTutors have completed a 16-module training course by TeachFirst and have completed sufficient safeguarding training.

How have the students improved? 7 students were entered to retake maths and/or English GCSE in the November examination series. 6 students were successful in securing a Grade 4 or above. Continued tuition and support will be made available to the student that didn't achieve a Grade 4.
