Can you find any famous alumni?</p>
<p>Read: 'The Composer's Handbook' by Bruce Cole. This book give you a step by step guide to composing in many different styles and genres.</p>	<p>Using technology, create a 'chill' remix of one of the set work for A level music. Alternatively, create a classical version of one of the pop pieces learnt during the course.</p>	<p>Research extended techniques on your instrument. Find a piece of music that requires some of these techniques and take it to your instrumental teacher.</p>
<p>Read: Nicholas Cook, Music: A Very Short Introduction (Oxford: OUP, 2000)</p>	<p>Organise a concert or recital of your A level performance pieces. Play these either to GCSE, KS3 or visit the primary schools. Alternatively, you could make a recording of your performances for other year groups.</p>	<p>Find a music group in your community. Join the group and perform in at least two concerts or gigs. Try to push yourself to perform a style of music that you have not performed before.</p>
<p>Read: A History of Western Music – Burkholder, Grout and Palisca</p>	<p>Go to ClassicFM and find a podcast on a style of music or composer from the A level syllabus. <a href="https://www.classicfm.com/discover-music/best-classical-music-podcasts/">https://www.classicfm.com/discover-music/best-classical-music-podcasts/</a></p>	<p>Find someone who needs some music tuition. This could be theory or practical. Give some tutoring to help them either pass a theory grade or help them learn a new piece on an instrument.</p>
