ALUMNI NEWS

Professor Penny Cook – now Assistant Dean

Penny Cook, Professor of Public Health, has been successfully appointed as Associate Dean: Research and Innovation for the School of Health and Society.

Penny joined the University of Salford in June 2012 to teach on the successful MSc Public Health, and was made Professor in 2013. Alongside teaching, she is currently completing an NIHR-funded 'community alcohol health champions' project (Communities in Charge of Alcohol, CICA), which is looking at how the communities can support each other with alcohol advice and whether communities can influence local alcohol licensing decisions.

She also leads a research team investigating the impacts of alcohol exposure during pregnancy, and associated Foetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD), in collaboration with the National FASD Clinic. Her research recently made news headlines with the shocking findings that this under-recognised condition may



affect 2-4% of children in the UK. She currently leads an NIHR funded project to test a parenting intervention for caregivers of children with FASD.

Research in other areas of public health include physical activity and the health benefits of greenspace. Her research on health and nature overlaps with a long-standing hobby—as an amateur ecologist, where she has co-authored books on ecological methods and studying invertebrates.

Penny will take up her new role from 1 October, with Professor Ben Light remaining in post until that date.

Dr Tim Ebbels now Professor at Imperial College.



Tim Ebbels is Professor of Biomedical Data Science and Head of Bioinformatics in the Department of Metabolism, Digestion and Reproduction at Imperial College London.

Tim gave a public lecture on Wednesday 18 January 2023, entitled -Metabolism Meets Machine Learning: Computational Metabolomics .

For the last 25 years, Professor Tim Ebbels has worked to extract more useful information from metabolomics measurements. From early work devising an “expert system” for drug toxicity assessment, through projects in environmental toxicity and molecular epidemiology, his team have been instrumental in developing some of the major tools used in modern metabolic science. In this lecture he will tell the story of this journey, crossing disciplines from physics to the exciting modern world of data rich biology. A key theme will be how the unique confluence of AI and high-throughput molecular measurements is enabling new discoveries in a variety of biological and biomedical problems.

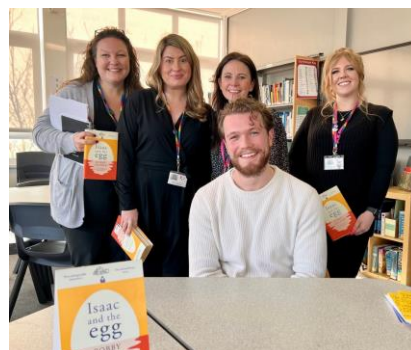
Martha is alive and well and is now one of the many involved in the Nursing profession performing an essential and invaluable role within our aging community in Gloucestershire.

The STAFF INTERVIEW

The staff interview: **Helen Hyam**
2022. Art teacher/tutor from April
2004 - present

1. What did you study at University/College – why that subject in particular?

I studied Fine Art at University of Herts but also studied Furniture and Product Design at Kingston Poly when I was 18 I did like the course although the dissertation at the end on Graveyard monuments was a bit grim.

2. Do you have any fond memories of your time at University/college? *Riding my bike trailing a wire installation constructed with tights, wire and yellow beak shapes!*
3. What made you go into teaching? *I did not like school particularly (walked out a lot) or drew things. I thought I might make a happier place for students and I like all the Art equipment but certainly not for the pay!*



4. Have you ever considered any other career path or worked in another industry? *I have painted murals/freelance artwork and worked at a cattery. I am probably a full-time artist.*

5. Why did you choose Roundwood Park School and have you ever worked in another school? *I worked at a junior school supporting with Art and at an after-school club. The Art Tech job was advertised and I really wanted it and applied twice!*

6. What aspects of your job at RPS do you especially enjoy and if you have to pick one thing that you most enjoyed what would it have been?



I really enjoy working 1:1 with students on screenprinting. I also enjoy displaying work, especially GCSE, which can be shown off with mounting and reactive techniques.

7. Do you have any moments that stand out that you are willing to share about your experiences at RPS? *I have especially enjoyed being a sixth form tutor and my sixth for tutees. Cooking bacon butties in studio 3 and stinking out the department (most were vegetarians). My sixth formers were heavily supported by cakes, bacon and sweets. We did have fruit Fridays. Dressing up in the department and walking through lessons and staff had to guess the artist.*

8. How do you feel you have made an impact at RPS in any of your roles at RPS? *There are more holes in the wall where I have hammered in nails. As a sixth form tutor I think I have made tough times fun. Maybe you should ask them!*

9. What are your passions/hobbies or pursuits in your spare
