## GILBERT BAKERS PRIDE FLAG

The rainbow flag, also known as the gay pride flag or simply pride flag, is a symbol of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) pride and LGBT social movements. The colours reflect the diversity of the LGBT community and the spectrum of human sexuality and gender. Using a rainbow flags as a symbol of gay pride began in San Francisto, Califợnia, but eventually became common at LGBT rights events worldwide.

## THE TRANS PRIDE FLAG

This flag was made in 1999 by Monica Helms, a trans woman. No matter how you fly it, it is always correct!

## THE ASEXUAL PRIDE FLAG

This flag was created as a joint effort by several asexual and aromantic associations and groups in 2010. Its design was agreed via a survey, making it (probably) the most democratic of all the flags.

## THE BI-SEXUAL PRIDE FLAG

Created by bisexual activist Michael Page. It is used to represent members of the bisexual community, and their fight for visibility.

## THE INTERSEX PRIDE FLAG

This is sadly an often overlooked community, created in Australia in 2013 by Morgan Carpenter. Its design seeks to use colours with no connection to gender.


THE PROGRESS LGBT+ FLAG
In 2018, a queer designer \& activist called Daniel Quasar released a flag with emphasis on inclusion and progression by incorporating new elements: brown for marginalised people of colour, black for those living with AIDS and those no longer living, and the trans pride flag. The arrow pointing to the right represents forward movement, but being along the left edge it shows that progress still needs to be made.

## THE PANSEXUAL PRIDE FLAG

This is the flag used by pansexual people, who aim to challenge prejudice and judgment against their community, as well as recognition. $\square$

## ON A HISTORICAL FICURE HARSHA P. JOHNSON

Marsha P. Johnson, also known as Malcolm Michaels Jr. was an American gay liberation activist, and identified as a transgender woman. Known as an outspoken advocate for gay rights, Johnson was one of the prominent figures in the Stonewall Uprising of 1969.

The Stonewall riots, also known as the Stonewall uprising, were a series of spontaneous protests by members of the gay community in response to a police raid, at the Stonewall Inn in the Greenwich Village neighbourhood of lower Manhattan in New York City. While police raids on gay bars were routine in the 1960s, officers quickly lost control of the situation. These riots are widely considered the watershed event that transformed the gay liberation movement and the twentieth centry fight for LGBT rights in the United States.

Along with fellow transgender woman, Sylvia Rivera, after the riot took place at Stonewall, they emerged leaders in the Gay Liberation Movement. Together they helped found the group STAR (Street Transvestite Action Revolutionaries), which offered housing to homeless and transgendered youth, a particularly vulnerable population at this time. Together, they opened the first LGBT1+ youth centre in North America, and they became the first women of colour to lead an organisation in the United States
