Key Knowledge or Enquiry Question	Drawing assessment shoe. Explore and research identity in relation to self and iconic personalities. Research the work of different artists who have explored this theme: Barbara Kruger, Shepard Fairey, Louis Jovier. Use this research to generate their own ideas for a piece of artwork. Gather reference material and develop own work Understand how to observe shape, detail and colour accurately. Drawing assessment Knowledge of the process of lino printing. Develop a portrait image into a lino print. Learn about the different cut qualities in the lino and their effects. Apply safety rules to the process. Learn the basics of printing with one colour (black) Experiment and be creative with use of different colours and collaged grounds. Designing and creating 2d images and then realising intentions when creating in 3D. development of colour theory and exploring using paint on a three dimensional form.
