
A new management team will now take over the running of the Alumni Association

The STAFF INTERVIEW

Jenny Durdey

(September 2001 - July 2023) Head of Art

1. Did you study Art at College/University and why that subject in particular?

The BA degree I followed was a combined studies course covering Textiles, Wood, Ceramics and Metal. I had always loved art and making things and was interested in a career in theatre costume or set design.





It was expected in those days to do a one-year Art Foundation course before an art degree. This course gave me a very good grounding in drawing as well as a strict work ethic. We were expected to always have our sketchbooks with us and constantly record what we saw around us. Criticism was dished out very readily in a Craig Revel-Horwood fashion; the course leader thought nothing of ripping work up if he didn't like it. Thankfully things have changed.

One of the best things about going to art college was being surrounded by creative people, not just those on my course but all the other arts and performing arts students. It was a time to grow up and make lifelong friendships. The course was very much about experimenting with the media and developing a creative thought process.

3. What made you go into teaching?

I avoided the teaching profession for 3 years, rejecting parental pressure to follow in their footsteps. During this time, I continued with my own art practice, worked in a museum and had a community arts job. The museum job was really interesting; as well as being a museum guide, we were creating an exhibition of cottage interiors in 4 different period styles. This involved going to derelict houses in and around Liverpool to find items such as old fireplaces, furniture, light fittings and so on. I recently revisited this museum and the cottages are still on show. The community arts job involved teaching art and movement to people of all ages and abilities including a 3-year-old girl who was allergic to sunlight and residents of an old people's home. At this time, I was also coaching trampolining and it was probably all these experiences that led me to do a PGCE art teachers' qualification in Cardiff.

Learning about the artistic development of children was fascinating and being amongst lots of trainee art teachers gave plenty of opportunity for shared practice.

- 4. Have you ever considered or undertaken another career path? In the 6th form, I did briefly consider doing Geography at university and made my applications but really my passion was always for art.
- 5. Why did you choose Roundwood Park School and have you ever worked in another school?

My first job after qualifying, took me to Stevenage. The job sounded great; the arts, including dance, were considered a really important part of the curriculum. As well as teaching art, I was given some CDT (technology) and textiles teaching and there was a strong gymnastics club, so I could continue trampoline coaching. However, it was a challenging start to my career; certainly, a baptism of fire.

After working in a few other Hertfordshire schools, I wanted to lead my own department so when the Head of Art job at Roundwood Park came up, I had to apply. I already knew some of the staff, the lovely Connor Geraghty being one, so I had some insight into what the school was like. As a result, I was more than happy when I was offered the post.

6. What aspects of your job at RPS do you especially enjoy and if you have to pick one thing that you most enjoyed what would it have been?

Obviously, the teaching is the best bit of the job. Of all the art processes I have taught, I particularly love teaching Lino-printing. It is so magical to see the results as they come off the printing press. I also love teaching oil painting; it is such a versatile medium. Being creative with all the different media and processes is such a joy. Other highlights are the whole day workshops I organised with visiting artists and the house art competitions. Students achieve so much more with extended time in the studio.

7. Do you have (m)any moments that stand out that you are willing to share about your experiences at RPS?

After 22 years, there really are so many memories and experiences I wouldn't want to pick one out.

8. What form/type of art work pleases you most and do you paint/draw or undertake any of these in your leisure time?

I enjoy a wide variety of art, there is so much to appreciate and learn from different styles and art forms. One of my favourite paintings is a self portrait by Stanley Spencer. In contrast I also enjoy more abstract, expressive artwork. I love seeking out art galleries and museums when on holiday and thinking how I could incorporate what I see into my teaching.

Over the years, teaching left little time to do my own artwork, so now is the time to get back to it. For me, it was always the process of drawing, painting and making that I enjoyed rather than the end result.

9. The school hall and foyer contain so many wonderful paintings – do you have any favourites?

There is one piece of work that will always stand out for me and that is Alex Makhoul's painting of his grandmother. Whilst we are all impressed by the photographic quality of this painting, to me it has more than this. There is a beauty in the expression and emotion conveyed which I don't tire of looking at.

10. You have regularly organised students' art exhibitions in school. Have you also organised trips out to galleries etc?

School trips are a highlight for students and teachers, creating many memories. The residential art trips I organised went to Paris, New York, Amsterdam and Berlin. I also organised a lot of day trips to museums and galleries. I love giving students the opportunity to broaden their experience this way and enjoy it as I do. Arriving in New York the year they had a record snowfall in February was wonderful. The streets and tourist sites were so quiet, no queues for the Empire State building, we saw the plans and beginnings of Ground Zero and Central Park was magical in the snow; one of the students described it as looking like Narnia.

I was also lucky enough to go on lots of trips organised by others; ski trips, the French Chateau, South Wales to name a few and I loved these times.

- 11. Would you consider doing art as a form of therapy?
- Art is definitely a form of therapy as many students will, I'm sure testify. I recently did an on-line life drawing class and it reminded me of the benefits of really focused observational drawing. It is almost like meditation. The practical, repetitive nature of some craft techniques can be really calming. I can't promote it enough.
- 12. How do you feel you made an impact at RPS in any of your roles at RPS?

 I like to think that the school environment has been improved by displaying students' work wherever we could claim display space. A great deal of superb work was produced during my time there. I hope I made people, students and staff, recognise the value of art for everyone and its importance in society.
- 13. What are your passions/hobbies or pursuits in your spare time?

 Dancing is my main pursuit these days. My partner Steve and I started ballroom dancing several years ago. Lots of lessons, exams and social dances in ballroom, Latin and more recently jiveswing dance has opened up a new life for us, making so many new friends. I also do two adult ballet classes a week; having done ballet during my teenage years and into my 20's it is great to be able to still do this later in life.
- 14. After two decades of teaching Art at RPS what will you miss most and least once you have left?

Of course, it is the students who I will miss; seeing their artistic development whether they are superb artists or those who really struggle. I miss the interaction with a

younger generation. I miss learning through the students and learning through the research I did to support the schemes of work. I miss being creative through others. I miss the chance to experiment with media and techniques using equipment and materials that were readily available in the department.

I miss the interaction with so many different people every day.

15. When students look back on their time at RPS how would you like to be remembered?

I hope I will be remembered for being a really good art teacher who was strict but fair and encouraged students to get the best out of themselves artistically. I hope I will be remembered for the extra time and kindness I gave to those students who needed it.
