CULTURE WEEK



HOUSE MUSIC

House Music is one of RPS's largest House events, attracting mass levels of participation. It showcases not only the great array of musical talents of RPS, but includes anyone who wants to sign up for the choir piece and attend rehearsals. Each year the event grows to new levels. The night opens with a spectacular number from singers to dancers and ends with an emotional performance of 'Thank You' for the Music', getting the audience on their feet.

> The staff choir performed 'Hold Back the River', with Ms Dale as conductor, which was as entertaining as usual. The SLG brought all their energy to the stage, with songs through the decades, with everything from the Head Student's solo of 'Since You've Been Gone' by Kelly Clarkson, to '24K Magic' by Bruno Mars.

Cadbury House rose to the top this year, taking the title from Frank House (winners of last year). Their performance piece was a particular standout with Emma performing a spectacular number by Whitney Houston, with a meaningful choir piece. Scott House were also successful this year, taking the title of Best Choir Piece performing 'Valerie', and Esmée and Lauren winning the Conductors' Award.

A word from the Cadbury Conductors ...

Taking on the role of Cadbury House conductors this year, our aim was to enthuse our choir and have fun while striving for an idea that set us apart - an idea to hopefully lead us to victory.

Our idea came to spread the message that 'music is for everyone', through incorporating sign language into our choir piece to carefully construct a performance to express the lyrics both visually and verbally aiming to include as many people as possible. We had to



create the balance between getting all the actions and signing in time and getting our message across which presented a challenge. After considering many different options, we finally decided, in the spirit of House Music, singing would take the forefront of the performance, with the choir signing the pre-chorus, and a group of year 12 girls signing the penultimate chorus for inclusivity. Eliciting a heartwarming moment of endearing reactions from the audience, we introduced our choir using sign language to obtain our message clearly, giving the choir the confidence to execute an incredible performance; well done Cadbury House!

Our win wouldn't have been possible however, without the winning performance from Emma (year 10) performing 'I have nothing' accompanied by the beautiful dancing from our two talented year 8s along with the band who worked to pull everything together. Everyone there contributed to a wonderful night which we think made Mr Hamilton's year!

WHAT DOES RPS DO FOR THE FOOD BANK?

Our Charity Captains Erin, Ella and Zara have worked closely with the St Albans and District Foodbank (one of our three school charities) throughout the year, to help those in need. They have organised food drives, like the Frank Charity event during House Music, and visited the Foodbank to sort out the donations they received. Finally, the total end of year funds raised are split between our three charities. Last year RPS raised a total of £8,667 for the Foodbank, which is expected to grow this year!

SPOTLIGHT ON A HISTORICAL FIGURE

SAINT NICHOLAS

Some believe that the true story of Santa Claus begins with Nicholas, who was born during the third century in the village of Patara in Asia Minor. His wealthy parents, who raised him to be a devout Christian, died in an epidemic while Nicholas was still young. Obeying Jesus'

words to ""sell what you own and give the money to the poor," Nicholas used his whole inheritance to assist the needy, the sick, and the suffering. He dedicated his life to serving God and was made Bishop of Myra while still a young man. Bishop Nicholas became known throughout the land for his generosity to those in need, his love for children, and his concern for sailors and ships.



In December 1773, and again in 1774, a New York newspaper reported that groups of Dutch Families had gathered to honour the anniversary of his death. The name Santa Claus evolved From Nick's Dutch nickname, Sinter Klaas, a shortened form of Sint Nikolaas (Dutch for Saint Nicholas).

BRIEF HISTORY OF HANUKKAH ALSO KNOWN AS THE 'FESTIVAL OF LIGHTS'

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Hanukkah is celebrated from the 7th of December to the 15th of December. In the year 168 B.C.E., the Syrian King Antiochus Epiphanes sent his soldiers to Jerusalem. The Syrians desecrated the Temple, the holiest place for Jews at that time. Antiochus also abolished Judaism, outlawing the observance of Shabbat and the festivals, as well as circumcision. Altars and idols were set up for the worship of Greek gods, and he offered Jews two options: conversion or death.

On the 25th day of the Hebrew month of Kislev in 168 B.C.E., the Temple was renamed for the Greek god Zeus. A Jewish resistance movement — led by a priestly family known as the Hasmoneans, or Maccabees — developed, resisting the cruelty of Antiochus. The head of the family was Mattathias, an elderly man. His son, Judah, became the chief strategist and military leader of the resistance. Though outnumbered, Judah Maccabee and his fighters miraculously won two major battles, routing the Syrians decisively.

Hanukkah, which means "dedication," is the Festival that commemorates the purification and rededication of the Temple Following the Greek occupation of that holy place.



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THE MIRACLE OF THE OIL

According to the legend, when the Maccabees entered the Temple and began to reclaim it from the Greeks, they immediately relit the ner tamid, which burned constantly in the Temple and has a parallel in our synagogues to this day. In the Temple, they found a single jar of oil, which was sufficient for only one day. The messenger who was sent to secure additional oil took eight days to complete his mission, and miraculously, the single jar of oil continued to burn until his return. The rabbis of the Talmud attributed the eight days of Hanukkah to the miracle of this single jar of oil. MANY MODERN JEWISH FAMILIES CELEBRATE BY LIGHTING THE HANUKKAH. ONE CANDLE PER NIGHT OF HANUKKAH IS LIT, LIKE HEBREW IS READ, FROM RIGHT TO LEFT. PEOPLE MIGHT ALSO PLAY DREIDEL GAMES AND EAT CERTAIN FOODS LIKE SUFGANIYOT (SIMILAR TO JELLY DONUTS) AND LATKES (FRIED POTATO PANCAKES).
